CLASS CHANGES—FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS SO FAR

Support for children's learning

Although the number of classes and therefore number of teachers is reducing, there are minimal changes in terms of our Teaching Assistants. Support for children with an EHCP will continue as outlined in their plan. Support for other children will also continue, and because there are fewer classes, children should benefit from a greater level of support as staff will not be split between as many classes, and interventions which sometimes have to be repeated across classes can now be organised as one group. Changes to class organisation will not compromise intervention groups or individual support.

• Support for children to be ready for the changes

Transition activities will take place during July as is always the case so that children can meet the staff who will be working with them next year and come together as the mixed classes. Due to the changes being implemented, there will be an even stronger focus on transition activities to support children to get used to the new arrangements during next half term.

Curriculum organisation

Our curriculum for English and Maths is cyclical in design so that throughout a year, and across year groups, children revisit key learning and concepts but at an increasingly challenging level. Our staff are already skilled in differentiating learning to meet the needs of all children in the class and the mixed classes will be an extension of this. Concepts across year groups more often than not will link and so can be taught at the same time, but at differing levels of complexity. Where there are objectives which do not progress across the year groups, these will be managed through separate teaching.

Staff are now working on the wider curriculum to ensure continuity and progression across all areas of learning under the new arrangements, and this will be shared with you before the end of term. RSE teaching will be separated for the different year groups so that children are only taught age-appropriate content.

• Which staff will be with each class?

This cannot be confirmed yet, but information will be shared as soon as staffing has been finalised. Prior to this announcement, a staffing restructure has been taking place, dictated by legal HR processes. This has set out the timeline with regards to sharing information with families.

• Further information for parents and carers

As part of transition activities, each class teacher will hold a "Meet the Teacher" session before we finish for the summer instead of in September, when this event has taken place in the past. At this meeting we will share curriculum information and answer any further questions that you might still have.

Class sizes

In Reception and Key Stage 1, the statutory class size limit is 30. In Key Stage 2, there is no statutory limit on class size, however Governors have agreed a limit of 32.

• Future intakes

It is hoped that birth rate will not remain as low as it is currently, and that this combined with housing developments will positively impact on Reception intake numbers in the future. However the current structure has been set up to sustain smaller class numbers for as long as necessary. This will remain under review so that if numbers allow, we can return to single classes.

• Will classes be split every year?

For as long as necessary, classes will remain mixed. However splitting classes is only necessary because our class sizes currently vary quite significantly. Splitting of classes will not be necessary once we can mix 2 classes together without exceeding the limits outlined above.

Please be assured that mixed cohorts are not unusual and this type of class organisation works very successfully in other schools. Those of you who have older children who attended St Vincent's will remember that mixed classes were actually in place here at St Vincent's until fairly recently, so many staff already have significant experience of teaching mixed age groups already.
