

What to Expect in Year 6

The move into Year 6 can be a daunting time for some – but it really doesn't have to be. Being in Year 6 truly is the most memorable time. It is a key moment in your child's life; they will develop more independence, a huge amount of resilience and, most importantly, they should become very aware of who they are becoming as both learners and as young adults.

What can you expect in Year 6 and how can you help your child during this unique and special year?

What will my child learn?

As in all other year groups, Year 6 follow statutory learning set out by the government. In both maths and English, there are a wide range of expectations for the children. For maths, this includes things like mental arithmetic, algebra, written methods of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, using fractions, decimals and percentages. In English, children are expected to write effectively for a range of purposes, use a full range of punctuation, write with a wide variety of sentence structures, use powerful vocabulary, and have generally accurate spelling. These are just some of the expectations. We will use class texts in English which have been carefully chosen to engage and inspire writing.

Children are assessed at the end of the year as to whether they have met the 'expected' national standard in English and maths. We will support the children in preparation for these assessments and the results will be communicated to parents in your child's end of year report. Parents' Evening will be an opportunity for us to talk about how your child is progressing with their learning.

We will also continue to develop our understanding in RE through our Come and See lessons. The children will enjoy the history, geography and science topics. They will learn in a wide range of subjects such as PE, art, design and technology, computing, music, Spanish and RSHE.

PE lessons will be on Tuesdays and Fridays. Please ensure that your child wears the correct PE kit to school on these days.

How can I help my child?

The most important thing is to help and encourage your child to complete their homework, including regular reading, spellings and times tables. Year 6 should be able to recall all of the times tables and division facts up to 12 x 12. They should know all of the Year 3/4 statutory words and some of the Y5/6 statutory words. They also should practise the weekly spelling patterns and rules.

In Year 6, homework is compulsory and non-engagement will be followed up. It will be set on Fridays to be handed in on Thursdays. Homework can be found on EdShed and Deepening Understanding and paper homework will be sent home some weeks too. Please visit Teams each week to see a list of what homework has been given out.

Your child will learn that it is their own hard work and effort that matters, not someone else's. So, as parents and teachers, we aim to develop your child's independence, organisation, and self-motivation in time for the increased demands of high school.
