Gospel Reflection - The Inner You

It is clear that we are not all born the same. We
 look at people who have achieved great things and
 imagine that they must have been born with a
 better brain or more talent. We look at people who
 do extraordinary things and imagine they must
 possess greater depths than we possess. These
 extraordinary people must have greater courage,
 greater determination or a clearer vision than we
 have. Is it just possible that we are not getting the
 full picture?

It is clear that we are not all born the same, and it
 is also clear, that as human beings, however hard
 we work we will always come up against our own
 limitations. As human beings there will always be
 times when we are hindered by fear, doubts and
 inadequacies. It's at times such as these that the
 Holy Spirit can step in and fire our humble human
 efforts. When we allow ourselves to be led by the
 Holy Spirit, great things are going to happen. Faith
 in the Spirit can't help but move us in the right
 direction. People like Mother Teresa of Calcutta
 would never have put her success down solely to
 her own human endeavour. Any praise she might
 have received would have been sent straight back
 to God.

On this, the Church's birthday, we share a very
 exciting link with those very first disciples. We are
 each given gifts and talents which we must share
 to best advantage. At Pentecost we are given
 tremendous insight into God's plan. We were not
 all born the same but we are all given the same
 twenty-four hours in a day. All we need to do to
 overcome our limitations is to ask the Holy Spirit
 to galvanise our human effort and involve us in
 Jesus' saving deeds.

Highway to Heaven

This week the parishioners of St Joseph's will pray for the residents of Finlay Avenue

Canon Christopher reflects When people attend special church services such as weddings or baptism they will often reflect on previous experiences and perhaps even make comparisons. At weddings it is good for married couples to reflect on their own relationships whether a success or a failure.

At Ordinations it is natural for a priest to reflect on where he is and the journey that brings him to that time. On Friday we have experienced the ordination to the diaconate of one of our parishioners, Hugh Donleavy, which is the last step before priesthood. It was uplifting as I was reminded of my early days as a student and the annual ordination that took place.

I was studying in the 1960s during the 2nd Vatican Council. It was a momentous time for the Church when the Holy Spirit was working overtime bringing about development of doctrine and liturgical progress. Prior to that there were seven steps to the priesthood as follows.

At the end of the third year of study we received 'Tonsure', when a small amount of hair is clipped from the top of the head. It meant we became clerics. Towards the end of the next two academic years we received Minor Orders: Porter (or Doorkeeper) symbolised by keys handed over and Lector (or Reader); then Exorcist and Acolyte (serving at the altar). These Minor Orders were given on Friday at the end of the annual week's retreat, coinciding with Pentecost week, an appropriate time of prayer for the coming of the Holy Spirit. (It was in 1973 that these Minor Orders were no longer given.)


On Saturday, the final day of our retreat Major Orders were given, principally priesthood. Subdiaconate was a Major Order but it doesn't exist nowadays. The role of the subdeacon was to assist the deacon before and during Mass with very little more to do, other than to pray in preparation for the next Order to be received. The Diaconate was given usually in September at the beginning of the sixth and final year of training. Prior to that the role of the deacon was very limited but the promise of celibacy was part of it.

In the light of the Vatican Council the order of deacons was restored and enhanced to fulfil its real purpose. It means that we also have permanent deacons who do not go on to priesthood but who still have the special role of participating in the liturgy together with the very important role of service to the church and its people. Our class was the first to benefit from this change. Unlike previously, deacons could now read the gospel and preach at Masses as well as baptising – usually limited to babies. Consequently, in that final year of training we went out to parishes at the weekend to perform all these liturgical roles. In my case, on Sundays with three other deacons, I went to help in the parish of Saint Philomena in Liverpool, as well as going back to the parish on Thursdays. It was quite an innovation compared with previous years when students didn't leave the college at all in term time.

The diaconate ordination this week therefore brought back many memories. Many years ago the ceremony for us was a much quieter affair within the confines of the seminary but it was really good to be part of this celebration on Friday with the family, parishioners and many people from far and wide who have helped Hugh to come to this day. The presence of the Holy Spirit was very evident. Now we look forward to the next and final step for Hugh which is priesthood. I am sure this too will be a wonderful celebration within our own parish later in the year. Let us pray for Hugh in these last months of preparation and ask the Lord to give us more young men who will offer their lives in the service of the Lord by serving the people in their care.

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Some Facts About Pentecost

- The Day of Pentecost, as recorded in Acts 2, occurred 50 days after Jesus' resurrection and 10 days after His ascension.
- The day celebrates the sending of the Holy Spirit to the disciples following Jesus' ascension.
- The Day of Pentecost is seen as the culmination of the Easter season.
- In many calendars, the day is listed as "Whitsunday." This comes from the phrase "White Sunday," and refers to practice of the newly baptized appearing in their white, baptismal garments on that day.
